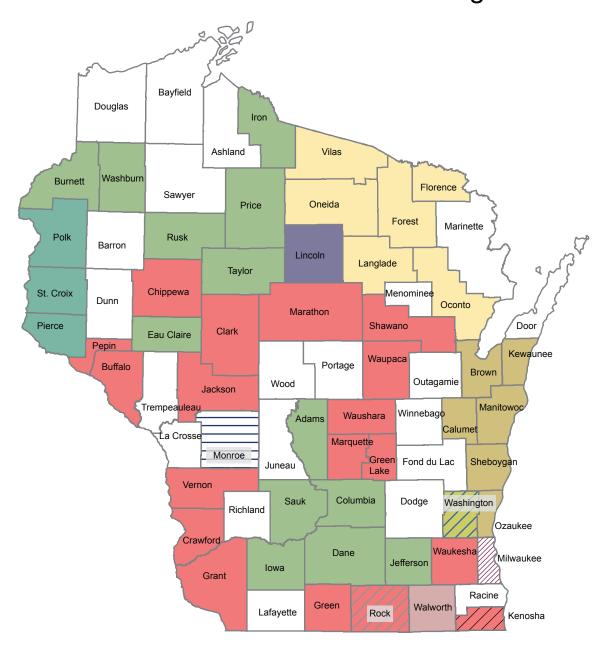

At the time of application and at each Annual Reexamination each family receives a VAWA certification form and an Information Sheet. They also receive an explanation of the program at the time of voucher issuance. The certification gives the applicant or participant the opportunity to inform WHEDA's agent of his/her status as a victim of actual or threatened domestic violence and give WHEDA's agent the information needed to make proper decisions based on the information. A form is provided to all participants upon their exit from the program as well. All such disclosures are dealt with in utmost privacy with the safety of the applicant or participant the primary issue.

Since the inception of VAWA there have been several participants that have expressed an interest in learning about the Act and several have taken advantage of its protections.

WHEDA's agents continue to educate our clientele and work with participants as they ask for information to determine how to use the protection the Act offers to the benefit of the families.
